How to take effective notes:



1 Use your Vocabulary Notebook to record and define new words. Practice writing some sentences.



2 When you have finished reading the chapter, take notes: write a few bullet points to summarise the chapter.



3 In your notes include main points/events, examples and your unanswered questions. Pretend like you are talking to the author.



4 Keep your notes personal: make examples and connections to your everyday life. This way, it will help you remember.



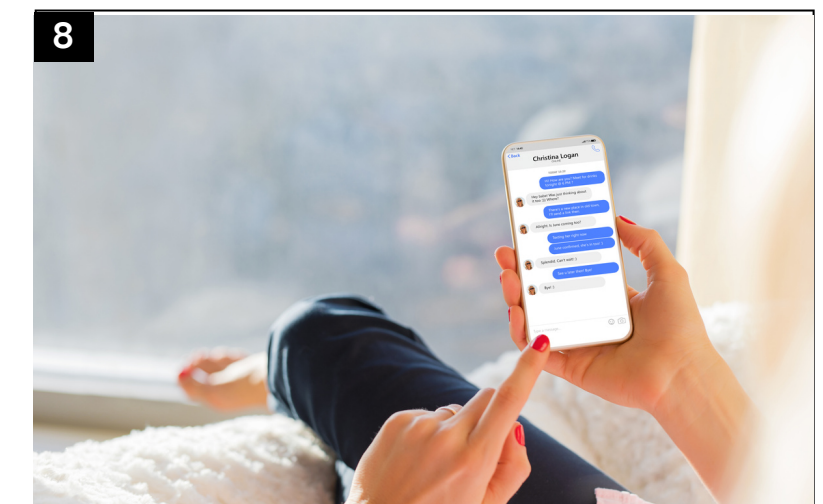
5 After reading the whole book, go over your notes and underline the comments/bullet points that are relevant.



6 Write a short summary of the book and don't forget to include your opinions.



7 Don't forget to add page numbers in your summary and to include memorable quotes!



8 Finally, share your views. Talk to your friends or online communities to exercise. It will help you form a memorable impression!

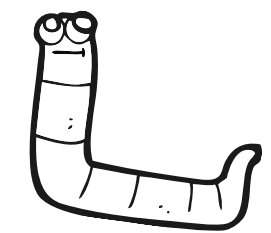
